The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS), Behavioral Health and Human Services (BHDDA) has contracted with the Michigan Developmental Disabilities Institute (MI-DDI) at Wayne State University to assist with the *Michigan National Core Indicators Program* and the *Michigan Home and Community Based Services Transition Project*.

The <u>Michigan National Core Indicators (NCI)</u> is implemented in 47 states including Michigan that surveys adults with disabilities. The core indicators are standard measures used across states to assess the outcomes of services provided to individuals and families. Indicators address key areas of concern including employment, rights, service planning, community inclusion, choice, and health and safety. MI-DDI staff and MI-DDI contractors will be interviewing individuals who have an intellectual and/or developmental disability and/or their proxy respondents. This survey process will conclude by May 31, 2020.

The <u>Michigan Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) Transition Project</u> is a statewide project to assist MDHHS/BHDDA to comply with Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services' (CMS) rule on the delivery of Medicaid's HCBS waiver services and supports. This project will collect data on the characteristics of the HCBS settings and services of the current HCBS beneficiaries and their providers. The HCBS survey will be collected via an online survey system. Surveys invitations will be emailed to respondents in spring 2020. The deadline to submit a survey is **TBD 2020**.

What is the purpose of the survey?	NCI is used in 47 states to collect and maintain valid and reliable data about the performance of public developmental disabilities service systems. This effort gathers a standard set of performance and outcome measures that can be used to track a state's own performance over time, to compare results across states, and to establish national benchmarks.	<ul> <li>In 2014, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) published a new rule for Medicaid's Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) waiver programs. This rule aims to improve the individual's experience in HCBS programs by: <ul> <li>a. enhancing access to the community,</li> <li>b. promoting service delivery in more integrated settings, and</li> <li>c. expanding the use of person-centered planning.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
